A1, The Impact of Equine Engagement on the Language Development of Individuals With Autism DE

All humankind is born with the ability to receive information and express information. We take what we see or hear and turn around and express our thoughts or feelings about those things to interact with others. There are those in this world who have been diagnosed on the Autism Spectrum and have challenges in those areas of receptive and expressive language. There are some who can receive information yet cannot express it and others who are able to express verbally yet have auditory processing challenges that prevent their receptive communication from being effective. Enter the partnership with an equine. The transparency of an individual on the Autism Spectrum coupled with the transparency of an equine partner allow for communication to occur that only the two can understand. We have all seen in the world of adaptive riding how an individual with autism and an equine partner can bond and deconstruct the triad of impairment so prevalent in those with autism. This triad consists of: deficits in social interaction, deficits in communication and repetitive patterns of behavior. Engagement between horse and rider begin to breakdown these barriers of communication with the guidance of a PATH Intl. CTRI and extra team members, such as a horse leader and side walker(s) should the rider require that support. By following cues of a rider on the Autism Spectrum, lessons can allow for opportunities of language development by modeling, encouraging, engaging and extending language and learning opportunities.

Kim Burnard is a special education teacher in California who is a language-speech & hearing specialist. She has been a PATH Intl. Certified Therapeutic Riding Instructor since September 2015 and became so following in the footsteps of her sister Sally. She is passionate about giving individuals with special needs the tools to communicate with both equine and human partners.

B1, The Dressage Training Scale CR Riding

Introduction of the dressage training scale and its application in the therapeutic riding setting and beyond.

C1, Polishing Up On Instruction CR Riding

Ready for a refresher after the pandemic slowdown or years of teaching? Join with colleagues for information on advancing your lesson instruction practices. Presentation includes an overview of current PATH Intl. standards related to instruction and updates to terminology related to equine-assisted services (EAS). Learning objectives include: identifying three techniques for modulating the environment to advance riders, identifying three advanced riding skills for inclusion in lessons, identifying three mandatory and three non-mandatory PATH Intl. standards relating to lesson instruction, identifying current terminology for three EAS categories and identifying three examples of "problematic terminology."

C2, Equine Bodywork: Using the Masterton Method to Support the WHOLE Program CR All

The Masterson Method form of equine bodywork is gaining recognition among EAS programs to improve the welfare of horses that work in these settings by improving performance and well-being. Bringing bodywork to EAS programs not only benefits the horses (less burnout, happier, more balanced bodies, less tension and compensatory issues, etc.), but it benefits the participants, volunteers, instructors, staff and even donors on many levels, (trust, connection, etc.)! The Masterson Method® is a unique approach to equine bodywork where the horse actively participates in the release of tension in the body. In fact, if you do not "stay beneath the horse's brace" and allow the horse to participate, it does not work. This form of bodywork improves performance and enhances well-being, communication and your relationship with the horse.

Stephanie Wilkins has completed an extensive training and certification with the Masterson Method (Masterson Method Certified Practitioner-MMCP), along with another certification specific to Equine Assisted Services Programs (Masterson Method Equine Specialist-MMES), Stephanie is now bringing her combined certifications and knowledge to support equine-assisted services programs.

D1. Fast. Fun. Fabulous Friend and Fundraisers CE

D2, Becoming Your Horse's True Leader CE

Training volunteers to work with horses should be more than simply teaching them the mechanics. Teaching horse handlers how horses relate to and communicate with one another can help them better understand how to be a true leader for their equine partner. This presentation will help volunteer coordinators, equine managers, and instructors learn how to develop a training program for horse handlers that incorporates herd dynamics for more effective leadership and communication between equines and volunteers. Attendees will learn how different personality traits of horse handlers make them effective in working with different horse types. Using an understanding of herd hierarchy, volunteers can be taught the best ways to use body language, confidence and demeanor to address common equine behaviors that may arise during a lesson.

Madison Pozzo is a PATH Intl. CTRI and assistant director at Special Equestrians. Maddie has been a PATH Intl. certified instructor and the volunteer coordinator for Special Equestrians since 2014. She has been riding since 1994 and has volunteered with PATH Intl. centers in Illinois, Georgia and Alabama since 2004.
