We are thrilled you are interested in pursuing the PATH Intl. Advanced Therapeutic Riding Instructor Certification! We look forward to helping you achieve your certification goals.

A PATH Intl. Advanced Therapeutic Riding Instructor is able to conduct an effective, safe equestrian lesson and demonstrate instruction that shows progression of riding skills for riders of all physical, cognitive and riding abilities.

APPLYING FOR ADVANCED CERTIFICATION

A PATH Intl. Certified Advanced Instructor is knowledgeable in horsemanship and disabilities and understands their relationships to therapeutic riding. Refer to the PATH Intl. Advanced instructor criteria booklet to learn about the skills and knowledge an instructor must possess in order to achieve certification at the PATH Intl. advanced level.

Pre-requisites for applying:

- Current PATH Intl. Professional Level Member
- At least 21 years of age
- Current adult and child CPR and first aid certifications

Applicants must submit their PATH Intl. Advanced Instructor Application (valid for one year) to PATH Intl. no less than 60 days prior to the certification event they intend to attend. *Please allow 14 days processing time from the date application is received.*

PATH Intl. Advanced Instructor Status Obtained (allow 45 days for processing)

Steps to Certification:

Step 1: Application Phase

- Submit an accommodation request (if applicable)
- Submit proof of child and adult CPR and first aid (100% online courses are accepted)
- Submit proof of professional membership OR submit PATH Intl. membership application with membership dues (please allow 14 days for processing)
- Submit a PATH Intl. Advanced Instructor
 Application (valid for one year) and fee to PATH Intl. no less than 60 days prior to the certification event.
- Please allow 14 days processing time from the date application is received.
- Complete **the online Standards Course and Exam** (score valid for one year)

Step 2: Education Phase

- Complete ONE of the following in the last TWO
 years. Certificate(s) of completion and/or a completed
 curriculum worksheet (see page 6) must be submitted
 with certification registration paperwork It is strongly
 recommended to complete the education phase
 before accruing your teaching hours.
 - A PATH Intl. Approved Training Course (recommended)
 OR
 - An advanced instructor prep workshop presented by PATH Intl. Advanced Evaluator Faculty (recommended)* OR
 - An advanced instructor prep workshop developed by a current advanced or master instructor OR a PATH Intl. Member Center**
 OR
 - Select and complete a collection of educational courses that satisfy the minimum curriculum guidelines

*PATH Intl. Member Centers may or may not offer an Advanced prep course immediately prior to certification. It is recommended that candidates complete the educational prerequisite well in advance of their certification in order to allow ample time to practice what is learned.

**If the prep course instructor(s) are not PATH Intl. Advanced Evaluator faculty, it is the responsibility of the candidate to verify that the prep course(s) satisfy the minimum curriculum guidelines.

- Complete a minimum of 120 hours instructing riders with disabilities in mounted activities at a PATH Intl. Member Center
- Attend a **PATH Intl. Advanced Therapeutic Riding Instructor on-site certification.**
- After successfully completing the on-site certification testing and results are processed by PATH Intl offices, candidate will receive an invoice for final exam, after payment, candidates will be enrolled in the **proctored** online Advanced examination (score valid for two years).

***The education provided can be delivered by professionals from a variety of fields whose current credentials address the components of therapeutic riding in the following areas: education, equine science, occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech therapy, special education, psychology, horsemanship, therapeutic recreation, and riding in variety of disciplines/levels.

ADVANCED CERTIFICATION COMPONENTS

Testing is comprised of 3 components consisting of unique segments:

Component 1: Horsemanship (on-site testing):

Segments: - Riding

- Stable management
- Lungeing
- Equine evaluation

Component 2: Teaching (on-site testing):

- Segments: Able-bodied lesson
 - Lesson for riders with disabilities who are working on upper level riding skills
 - Lesson for riders with disabilities who require leader/sidewalker assistance and management

Component 3: Online Proctored Exam – *completed* AFTER attending on-site certification testing and results are processed by PATH Intl. offices

On-site Certification: Demonstrations for the Horsemanship and Teaching Components

Candidates' riding, lungeing and instruction skills will be assessed by two PATH Intl. Evaluators. These individuals have been through specialized training and have commensurate knowledge of the certification process.

Component 1: On-site Horsemanship Component Candidates will be assigned 2 different equines to ride.

- All candidates must wear ASTM/SEI approved helmets during their riding demonstration.
- Candidates will groom and tack their mounts.
- The riding segment will be conducted in a group.
- Candidates will be divided into groups as circumstances dictate.
- Candidates will ride their seat of preference for their first ride. Candidates may choose to ride hunt seat, dressage, or western but may also be asked to demonstrate some proficiency in another discipline. Advanced level instructors are expected to be very skilled in at least one discipline and functionally adequate in another.
- Candidates will be asked to perform skills included in the Advanced instructor criteria common to each discipline and should perform them appropriately for the discipline in which they are riding (e.g., Western riders may be asked to perform a side-pass, dressage riders a leg-yield, etc.).
- Candidates will be expected to warm up their equines appropriate to the equine's needs and

- demonstrate an equine assessment, utilizing the riding skills listed in the Advanced Criteria.
- Evaluators may select specific skills from the criteria and request candidates perform them either individually or as a group. Candidates will be asked to dismount and ride a second equine. The second ride may or may not be tacked in the candidate's preferred discipline. No tack changes (other than for safety concerns or for stirrup length) will be permitted.
- Questions regarding the use of artificial aids should be directed to the host site representative.
- Ride times may vary slightly according to circumstances, but candidates should anticipate a total ride time (including the second equine) of approximately 1 ½ hours.
- After dismounting the second equine, candidates will meet individually with the evaluators to verbally assess the two equines they rode.

The Lungeing Segment:

The purpose of lunging segment is to assess the candidate's ability to handle a horse on the ground with a lunge line and whip. The lungeing segment is designed to show the candidate's knowledge of assessing soundness and energy level of the equine prior to a work session as well as demonstrate the use of a lunge line and whip as training tools. The lungeing segment is a fiveminute demonstration and the candidate should be able to assess the fitness level of the equine and provide an appropriate lungeing session. Lungeing must include walk and trot in each direction and may include cantering if appropriate.

- Candidates will be assigned one equine to lunge for five minutes.
- The host site will groom the equine and apply leg protection if needed.
- The candidate must lunge the horse in a snaffle bridle and must use a lunge line and lunge whip.
- The host site will bridle the horse and present the horse to the candidate in a bridle and lead rope.
- The lunge line will be attached by the candidate and must be connected to the horse using one of the following options:
 - 1. Directly to the bit (only if the horse has a *flash or dropped nose band)*
 - 2. Through the bit and over the poll to the bit on the opposite side of the horse
 - To the bit and the noseband

- No additional lunging equipment will be required or allowed.
- Lunge lines may be looped or folded in the candidate's hands and must be managed safely and effectively. See photos for acceptable methods of holding the lunge line.

- When lungeing, equines should travel in both directions and candidates should demonstrate what is appropriate for the amount of time and the equine's needs (walk/trot or walk/trot/canter).
- Candidates may be asked questions about their lungeing demonstration during the equine assessment.

Component 2: The Teaching Segments

Candidates will teach a total of three lessons: one to an able-bodied rider and two to three riders with disabilities.

- Lesson for able-bodied rider: Candidates will teach a 15 minute lesson to a group of two ablebodied riders.
- Candidates will draw the riding skill to be taught (any of those listed in the Advanced Criteria) immediately before **entering the arena**.
- The riders assigned will be of at least intermediate skill level (**secure at** walk, trot, and canter), appropriately matched to the skills to be drawn.
- The riders and equines will be warmed up **before** the candidate enters the arena and the lesson time begins.
- The equines chosen for this component will be able to walk, trot/jog and canter/lope and will also have basic training in lateral movements.

Skills that may be taught from the criteria may include, but are not limited to: turn on the forehand, bending a horse through corners, on circles and ring figures, leg yield, shoulder in, haunches in, turn on the haunches, half halts, simple change of lead through the trot, transitions, and lengthening and shortening at the walk and trot/jog.

Lessons for riders with disabilities:

Candidates will teach two lessons to three students with disabilities: one lesson with riders working on upper level riding skills and one lesson with riders who require leader/sidewalker assistance and management.

- Teaching times will be drawn out of a hat.
- Candidates must be on site at least one hour before their assigned teaching times.
- Lessons for riders with disabilities will be 30 minutes long, from first mount to last dismount. (Some flexibility may be granted for difficult mounts/dismounts).
- Both lessons will have three riders each.
- Rider profiles must be supplied to the candidates the evening before their assigned lesson time.
- Lesson plans should be developed based on the information provided in the rider profiles.
 Candidates will provide their lesson plans to the evaluators prior to the beginning of the lessons.
- Candidates are considered responsible for the safety of the lesson and may choose to change or adjust tack, provide guidance to volunteers, etc.
 Remember to be courteous and professional.
- Both lessons **may** have a mix of riders with cognitive and physical disabilities.
- One lesson must include a rider with a mobility challenge and demonstrate a non-traditional mount/dismount (crest, lift, stand pivot, two person lift).
- One lesson may also include a participant with communication or behavioral challenge(s).

The riders in the lessons will be matched by their skill level, not disability type:

- Lesson #1 will include riders who are working on upper level riding skills (walk, trot/jog, possibly canter/lope or upper-level lateral movements as identified in the criteria under AI - Instruction). The horses they will be riding should also be capable of these skills.
- Lesson #2 will include riders who require leader/sidewalker assistance and management. The riders may need the volunteer support for physical, behavioral, cognitive, or attention challenges.

- If a lift mount is required, the host site will provide orientation and instruction about how the lift works.
- Candidates should be experienced and prepared to do mounts that may include any of the following: crest, lift, stand pivot, two person lift
- Candidates will turn in their lesson plans to the evaluators before starting their lessons.
 After the lesson, candidates will pick up their lesson plans from the evaluators, complete a selfevaluation/lesson reflection, then return them to the evaluators.
- The self-evaluation/lesson reflection must be done independently and must include assessment of at least one equine/rider/tack match from one of the lessons.
- Candidates are responsible for ensuring that their horses, volunteers and arena are set up for the class. The host site representative will identify volunteer needs for each rider. Candidates are responsible to confirm with the host site representative how these needs will be met on the day of certification.
- Candidates are expected to make any equipment or other changes deemed necessary.
- Every effort will be made by the host site to provide suitable riders, volunteers and horses; however, as in any therapeutic riding program, there exists the possibility of last minute substitutions. In the event that a substitution is made, the host site representative will provide the candidate with information specific to the change.

Component 3: Online Proctored Exam

- After successfully completing the on-site certification testing candidate will be enrolled in the online proctored exam
- Candidates must score an 80% or above to pass the examination.
- The exam may be retaken as many times as needed for a \$35 fee. Please allow 2 business days following completion of payment for reenrollment.
- The exam must be proctored each time, though the proctor does not need to be the same person for each attempt. A proctor letter should be submitted for each proctor present.

REGISTERING FOR ADVANCED CERTIFICATION

It is recommended that candidates do not make nonrefundable travel arrangements until the registration deadline has passed and it has been determined that the certification will take place.

Eligibility for registering:

- Have submitted a PATH Intl. Advanced Instructor application to the PATH Intl. office (valid for one year) no less than 60 days prior to the certification event.
- Have a minimum of 120 hours instructing riders with disabilities in mounted activities at a current PATH Intl. Member Center (exceptions to teaching hours completed at a PATH Intl. Member Center must be made in writing to PATH Intl.).
- Have completed the PATH Intl. Standards exam with a score of 90% or better less than one year prior to the date of certification testing. PATH Intl Standard Exam scores are valid for one year.

Certification Registration Paperwork Submitted to the Host Site:

- Personal reference
- Professional reference
- PATH Intl. Member Center reference

Advanced Certification Policies and Procedures:

- All registration deadlines are no less than 32 days prior to the certification—registrations received after the deadline will only be accepted at the host site's discretion.
- The registration fee for the advanced on-site certification is determined by the host site.
- Maximum attendance for each certification may vary, depending on the host site's choice of certification format. Qualified applicants will be accepted on a first come, first served basis.
- Minimum attendance for each certification will be based on the format of certification. If less than the minimum number of candidates registers for a location by the application deadline, the certification may be canceled.

<u>Candidates should verify with the host site regarding refund policies.</u>

ON-SITE CERTIFICATION RESULTS

At the completion of the on-site certification, the evaluators will schedule individual exit interviews with each candidate. Candidates will receive a copy of their results during the exit interview. **PLEASE NOTE:** on-site certification results are not considered official until PATH Intl. confirms all requirements have been met.

Upon conclusion of the certification, the results are sent to PATH Intl. to be processed. Formal notification of the results will be sent to the candidate by PATH Intl.

via US Mail within 45 days after the completion of the certification.

RESUBMISSION PROCESSES

Component 1: Horsemanship:

Segments: - Riding

- Stable management
- Lungeing
- Equine evaluation

Component 2: Teaching:

Segments: - Able-bodied lesson

- Lesson for riders with disabilities who are working on upper level riding skills
- Lesson for riders with disabilities who require leader/sidewalker assistance and management
- If a candidate is found not to meet criteria for any segment of components 2 or 3, the candidate will only be required to resubmit for the segment(s) found not to meet criteria in order to earn certification.
- Resubmission for any segment of components 2 and 3 must be completed at an on-site certification.
- Candidates are permitted to resubmit for ONLY the segments found not to meet criteria.

Candidates must contact host sites to register for the segments they need to resubmit. Resubmission forms and application fee are due to the host site. The host site is responsible for submitting the candidate resubmission results and fees to PATH Intl.

Component 3: Online Advanced Exam

The online exam may be retaken as many times as needed. A \$35 retake fee will be accessed for each reenrollment. Please allow 2 business days following completion of payment for reenrollment. The exam must be proctored each time, though the proctor does not need to be the same person for each attempt. A proctor letter should be submitted for each proctor present.

NOTE: Video resubmissions are not accepted. The following paperwork must be provided to the host site at the time of resubmission:

- Copy of previous results letter
- Proof of membership with PATH Intl. must be current at the time of resubmission.
- Copies of adult & child CPR and first aid certifications – must be current at the time of resubmission.
- A valid score on the online Advanced instructor exam (must be less than two years old)
- Proof of completion of an educational prerequisite

ACCOMMODATIONS

An accommodation is an adjustment or an adaptation of a component or components of the registered instructor certification process in order to meet the special needs of a candidate.

Reasonable accommodations may be granted to qualified individuals with known disabilities, unless doing so would result in a fundamental change to the certification criteria, create an undue hardship or cause a direct threat to health or safety.

Requests for an accommodation to any part of the process must be made in writing by the candidate and submitted to the PATH Intl. office. All requests for accommodation must be accompanied by a letter from a physician (with letterhead and physician's handwritten signature) verifying the diagnosis and defining the candidate's limitations to help PATH Intl. determine appropriate, reasonable accommodations on an individual basis. Please visit the website at http://www.pathintl.org/40-resources/certification/936-accommodations to obtain the Reasonable Accommodation Policies and Procedures instructional booklet for the necessary forms.

Accommodation requests should be submitted with the initial instructor application. An accommodation request may be submitted after the instructor application has been received by PATH Intl., but sufficient processing time should be provided prior to the intended date of certification. Please allow up to 60 days to receive accommodation request results in all cases.*

*PATH Intl. and affiliated centers are not responsible for refunding OSWC registration fees or travel expenses in the event that an accommodation request is submitted with insufficient processing time.

Submitting a Reasonable Accommodation Request

If an advanced instructor candidate is unable to physically demonstrate competence of certain PATH Intl. Advanced Level Instructor criteria due to physical limitations caused by a disability, the following must be provided to the PATH Intl. Certification Coordinator no less than 60 days prior to certification:

- 1) A request in writing, by the candidate, which includes an explanation of the reason for a physical accommodation.
- A letter from a physician (with letterhead and physician's handwritten signature) verifying the diagnosis and defining the candidate's limitations.
- 3) If requesting a riding accommodation:
 Documentation of prior demonstration and aptitude
 of riding skills that satisfy the PATH Intl. Advanced
 Level Instructor Horsemanship Criteria. The

- 4) candidate must propose which criteria is/are satisfied by each piece of documentation. Acceptable documentation may include but is not limited to:
 - certifications/credentials earned through other riding certification programs
 - competition score sheets
 - references from qualified and certified riding professionals
 - videos*
 - photographs*

*Copy of driver's license must be provided to verify identity

NOTE: PATH Intl. reserves the right to request additional supporting documentation.

Physical accommodation requests will be reviewed by PATH Intl. on an individual basis to determine appropriate, reasonable accommodations. Candidates will be notified of the decision. When a request for a physical accommodation is approved, PATH Intl. will notify the candidate, certification site and faculty, and assist in making necessary arrangements.

PATH Intl. Evaluators assess candidates' knowledge and skill level. PATH Intl. Advanced Therapeutic Riding Instructor certification will be awarded to instructors who demonstrate comprehensive knowledge of equines and riding skills, skilled riding performance, knowledgeable and effective instruction that promotes progression of riding skills and safety while instructing mounted therapeutic riding lessons to individuals of all abilities.

Welcome!

- Testing situations can be stressful
- Try to look at this as not just a test, but also as a valuable learning experience.
- Evaluators must maintain objectivity and keep conflicts of interest to a minimum, so they may appear somewhat distant. Most questions should be referred to the host site representative.
- Please remember to:
 - Support each other
 - o Help set up the arena
 - o Treat host site staff, volunteers and equines with respect and kindness.
- Candidates are welcome to observe each other's lessons, but no photography or recording of any kind is allowed.
- All candidates will be provided with a tour of the facility prior to the start of testing.
- Teaching times will be drawn at random.

Stable Management

- Candidates will be observed and evaluated throughout the testing regarding handling of equines, respect for the equine, respect for center policy and overall safety awareness in the stable environment.
- Candidates will effectively and efficiently catch, halter, lead, secure, groom and tack up their assigned equine.
- If an equine's tack does not fit correctly, it is expected that the candidate will identify and rectify this concern.

Stable management questions which may be asked during the Horse Assessment segment:

How is the equine's behavior during grooming and tacking? AE 3.2/3.3, 6.1 (2)

Does the equine have any vices? AE 3.4


How does the bridle, saddle, equipment fit? AE 8.4/8.5

Would the equine be appropriate to partner with for a participant doing groundwork? AI 1.3, AE 3.2/3.3

Lungeing

- Candidates will be assigned one equine to lunge for five minutes.
- The host site will groom the equine and apply leg protection if needed.
- The candidate must lunge the horse in a snaffle bridle and must use a lunge line and lunge whip. The host site will bridle the horse.
- The lunge line will be attached by the candidate and must be connected to the horse using one of the following options:
 - 4. Directly to the bit (only if the horse has a flash or dropped nose band)
 - 5. Through the bit and over the poll to the bit on the opposite side of the horse
 - 6. To the bit and the noseband







- No additional lunging equipment will be required or allowed.
- Lunge lines may be looped or folded in the candidate's hands and must be managed safely and effectively. See photos for acceptable methods of holding the lunge line.







- When lungeing, equines should travel in both directions and candidates should demonstrate what is appropriate for the amount of time and the equine's needs (walk/trot or walk/trot/canter).
- Candidates may be asked questions about their lungeing demonstration during the equine assessment.

Lungeing related questions which may be asked during the Horse Assessment segment:

Is lungeing appropriate for this equine? AE 10.3

How would lungeing **benefit** this equine? AE 10.3/10.4

What equipment would you use for lungeing this equine in the future? AE 8.1, 8.4, AE 5.7

Riding Test

- All candidates will ride 2 different equines.
- The riding segment will be done as a group.
- Candidates will be divided into groups as circumstances dictate.
- Candidates will ride their seat of preference for their first ride.
- Candidates will be expected to warm up their equines appropriate to the equine's needs and demonstrate an equine assessment, utilizing the riding skills listed in the Advanced Criteria.
- Evaluators may select specific skills from the criteria and request candidates perform them either individually or as a group.
- Candidates will be asked to dismount and ride a second equine. The second ride may or may not be tacked in the candidate's preferred discipline. No tack changes (other than for safety concerns or for stirrup length) will be permitted.
- Questions regarding the use of artificial aids should be directed to the host site representative.
- Ride times may vary slightly according to circumstances, but candidates should anticipate a total ride time, including the second horse, of approximately 1 ½ hours.
- After dismounting the second equine, candidates will meet individually with the evaluators to verbally assess the two equines they rode.

Some of the questions that may be asked by the evaluators during the Equine Assessment segment may include those relating to Stable Management, Lungeing and the following:

How does the equine's conformation impact his performance? (form to function) AE 9.5

Is the equine appropriate for therapeutic riding? AE 10.1

What sort of participants/riders would be best suited to the equine? AI 1.3

What sort of continuing education would the equine benefit from? AE 10.3

Describe if the equine demonstrated tempo, rhythm, impulsion, and tracking up. AE 9.3

What activities would you include for this equine's training progression? AE 10.3

What suppling activities would be beneficial to this equine? AE 10.3

How does the equine's conditioning impact his performance? AE 10.4

Was the tack and equipment appropriate for the equine? AE 8.4

Lessons for riders without disabilities

- Candidates will teach a 15-minute lesson to a group of two able-bodied riders
- Candidates will draw the riding skill to be taught (any of those listed in the Advanced Criteria) immediately before **entering the arena**.
- The riders assigned will be of at least intermediate skill level (**secure at** walk, trot, and canter), appropriately matched to the skills to be drawn.
- The riders and equines will be warmed up **before the candidate enters the arena and the lesson time begins**.
- The equines chosen for this component will be able to walk, trot/jog and canter/lope and will also have basic training in lateral movements.
- Skills that may be taught from the criteria may include, but are not limited to: turn on the forehand, bending a horse through corners, on circles and ring figures, leg yield, shoulder in, haunches in, turn on the haunches, half halts, simple change of lead through the trot, transitions, and lengthening and shortening at the walk and trot/jog.

Lessons for riders with disabilities

- Teaching times will be drawn out of a hat.
- Rider profiles will be given to candidates the evening before the assigned lesson.
- Candidates must be on site at least one hour before their assigned teaching times.
- Lessons for riders with disabilities will be 30 minutes long, from first mount to last dismount. (Some flexibility may be granted for difficult mounts/dismounts).
- Both lessons must have three riders each.
- Rider profiles must be supplied to the candidates the evening before their assigned lesson time.
- Candidates are considered responsible for the safety of the lesson and may choose to change or adjust tack, provide guidance to volunteers, etc. Remember to be courteous and professional.
- Both lessons **may** have a mix of riders with cognitive and physical disabilities.
- One lesson must include a rider with a mobility challenge and demonstrate a non-traditional mount/dismount (crest, lift, stand pivot, two person lift).
- One lesson may also include a participant with communication or behavioral challenge(s).
- The riders in the lessons will be matched by their skill level, not disability type:
 - Lesson #1 will include riders who are working on upper level riding skills (walk, trot/jog, possibly canter/lope or upper level lateral movements as identified in the criteria under AI Instruction). The horses they will be riding should also be capable of these skills.
 - o <u>Lesson #2</u> will include riders who require leader/sidewalker assistance and management. The riders may need the volunteer support for physical, behavioral, cognitive, or attention challenges.
- If a lift mount is required, the host site will provide orientation and instruction about how the lift works.
- Candidates should be experienced and prepared to do mounts that may include any of the following: crest, lift, stand pivot, two person lift
- Candidates will turn in their lesson plans to the evaluators before starting their lessons.
- After the lesson, candidates will pick up their lesson plans from the evaluators, complete a self-evaluation/lesson reflection, then return them to the evaluators.
- The self-evaluation/lesson reflection must be done independently and must include assessment of at least one equine/rider/tack match from one of the lessons.

Results

Once the last lesson is finished, evaluators will confer, complete and print reports, make copies, etc. This **will be done with care and can take several hours**. Exit interviews will be scheduled at 30-minute intervals and conducted privately with each candidate, typically in the order the lessons were taught.



PATH Intl. Event Code of Conduct

PATH Intl. is committed to providing a safe, professional and inclusive experience for all individuals participating in PATH Intl. events. All attendees at PATH Intl. events are expected to conduct themselves with integrity in a cooperative and courteous manner and not engage in disruptive behavior, disorderly conduct or intentionally interfere in the freedom of expression of others. Expectations include, but are not limited to:

- Support a welcoming and positive environment
- Respect the views of others
- Engage positively in group conversations and/or activities
- Encourage redirection of negative behaviors, responses or communication

Disruptive behavior or disorderly conduct compromises the learning environment that attendees and PATH Intl. representatives have invested their time and money to attend. "Disruptive behavior" or "disorderly conduct" means behavior that a reasonable presenter or attendee would view as intentionally interfering with normal event functions or activities. Examples include, but are not limited to:

- Persistently speaking or commenting without being recognized or interrupting other speakers
- Behavior that distracts from the subject matter or discussion
- Refusal to comply with faculty/presenter direction, including refusal to work in a group
- Behavior that has a negative impact on the learning environment
- Audibly using a cell phone during a classroom session (unless as an assistive device)
- In extreme cases, physical threats, harassing behavior or personal insults

In cases where an attendee conducts themselves in a manner that detracts from a respectful and conducive learning environment, PATH Intl. representatives will provide a warning to communicate the specific concerns about the attendee's conduct. If the attendee does not appropriately respond to sufficiently ameliorate the situation, PATH Intl. representatives are authorized to excuse that attendee from the activity by, but not limited to, the following:

- 1) Temporary or total dismissal from the room in which the PATH Intl. activity is being held
- 2) Temporary or total dismissal from the facility or grounds hosting the PATH Intl. event
- 3) Temporary or total dismissal from the PATH Intl. professional event

Dismissal from a PATH Intl. event may result in forfeiture of registration fees, certificate of participation or completion and/or certification results.
