A1, Intentional Program Planning for Sustainability and Sanity Part 1 CE

Whether looking to design a new program or improve tracking systems for implementation and evaluation, this conversation is for you. A logic model (tool) is the foundation for understanding intention/needs, planning/logistics and goals/sustainability. While lofty, this is completely manageable and fun!

Aviva Vincent, PhD, LMSW is a veterinary social worker and co-owner of Healing Paws LLC. She is social work faculty at Cleveland State University and a PATH Intl. CTRI® and ESMHL at Fieldstone Farm Therapeutic Riding Center. Dr. Vincent is trained in results-based accountability for organizational strategic planning and evaluation. She holds facilitator training through the Harwood Institute, Sustained Dialogue and the Institute for Social Change. As a social justice advocate, she centers DEI in her practice inclusive of access and belonging. She is on the PATH International board of trustees wherein she chairs the Diversity Equity and Inclusion Committee. She also chairs the conference committee for the International Association of Veterinary Social Work.

A2. Silver Saddles CE

Learn about a pilot project of a creative approach to healing sexual trauma through the integration of feminist and trauma-informed healing principles with equine partners and volunteer mentors, through a six-week therapy group for young female and non-binary-identified survivors of sexual assault.

Laura Sanders, LMSW has been an instructor in U of M's graduate social work program for 27 years and a therapist in the Ann Arbor area for 35 years. She provides private therapy, consultation, training and supervision in healing sexual abuse, trauma, attachment and adoption, relational and behavioral problems, and applies culturally sensitive adaptations of methods to diverse populations. She is a PATH Intl. ESMHL and owns a small private practice, Lovingway Therapeutic Farm, a PATH Intl. center member, where she partners with horses, a variety of other farm animals and a core group of volunteers to provide therapy services.

C1, Volunteers - Can't Live Without Them! CE

This presentation will deep dive into program volunteers. Regardless of your role at a PATH Intl. center whether a program director, instructor, or volunteer coordinator, all positions are equally important in keeping volunteers actively engaged in the program.

Hannah Hayes has worked in the EAS industry for the past 13 years. She has an Associates Degree in Equine Reproduction and Management from Ohio State University and is a current PATH Intl. CTRI®. Hannah currently works at The Achievement Centers for Children - Camp Cheerful in Strongsville Ohio as a full time Volunteer Coordinator/PATH Intl. CTRI®.

C2, Supporting Military Families in Equine-Assisted Services CE

With an appreciation for each family's unique experience in and post military service, there are consistent experiences for families who engage in military service which include stressors and opportunities for growth, compared to civilian families. Military families deserve targeted support to establish and maintain wellbeing. This presentation will provide an overview of the current research regarding family-focused interventions for military families, inclusive of the research within equine-assisted services focused on military families.

Leanne Nieforth, MS, PhD has a doctorate in human-animal interaction and is an assistant professor of Human-Animal Interaction at the Center for the Human-Animal Bond at the Purdue University College of Veterinary Medicine. She has training in multiple models of EAS, and is a PATH Intl. ESMHL. Her research explores human-animal interactions from a multi-modal biopsychosocial approach. She is a member of the PATH Intl. D1, Hospitality in EAS: A Practice that Moves the Margins DE

Attendees will learn the latest definitions of disability and ableism, as well innovations in disability studies to think through ways that our industry may unintentionally marginalize people. We will imagine together how we can not only serve people with disabilities well but also be ready to receive their gifts and talents with grace and purpose.

Ben Conner is Professor of Practical Theology and Director of the Center for Disability and Ministry at Western Theological Seminary in Holland, Michigan. He is the author of three books on disability and editor of a series of books focusing on disability and theology. He is a volunteer at Renew Therapeutic Riding Center and is in the process of becoming an Equine Specialist in the Masterson Method.

1 - 2 p.m.

E1, The Masterson Method in EAS Settings CR All

Give a gift to the horses who do so much for us through The Masterson Method. This equine massage technique utilizes gentle touch to access and release tension. Horses participating in EAS activities may internalize a lot of stimulation doing their job, leading to a natural build up mental and physical tension over time, possibly leading to restrictions and discomfort during the work they are asked to do. This simple method can be performed by almost anyone who is willing, benefitting both parties in the process.

Sophie Wayner struggled with a highly sensitive fight or flight response since she was small and was enlightened with a diagnosis of autism at 21-years-old and found inspiration connecting her own responses to the responses she observed in her equine friends. She heard about Masterson Method through a friend. After earning her certification as a Masterson Equine Specialist, Sophie began the process of integrating this method into Centenary University's Therapeutic Riding Program where she has been volunteering for over two years. She aims to bring releases of tension and comfort to her school and EAS horses by sharing all she has learned with staff, volunteers, and participants. The Masterson Method is Sophie's passion along with spending time at the barn with her horses Libbie and Andy, pursuing an Animal Health degree at Centenary University, and being a part of Centenary's Intercollegiate Dressage Association as a first level rider.

E2, A Psychotherapy Incorporating Equines Pilot Program and Client Satisfaction CE

While the research for psychotherapy incorporating equines demonstrates effectiveness in decreasing PTSD symptoms, there is a lack of evidence to verify client satisfaction. This presentation will disseminate the results of a mixed-methods study to evaluate client satisfaction after participating in an eight-week program, including outcome measures used, participant data, program protocol, and client recommendations for future programming.

Emili Alexander is a second career occupational therapist with experience in multiple settings and populations, including inpatient psychiatric health and outpatient lymphedema. Emili currently works at the George

Washington University Hospital in Washington D.C. as an OTR/L, CLT (Certified Lymphedema Therapist), and is a CPRP (Certified Psychiatric Rehabilitation Practitioner) through the Psychiatric Rehabilitation Association. Emili has plans to continue research in areas of therapy incorporating equines, mental health, and animal-assisted therapy in conjunction with lymphedema treatment. She looks forward to meeting all the like-minded, great EAS professionals at the conference and would love to collaborate on any research opportunities.

Aubrey Boerema is the founder and Executive Director of Thriving Tides Therapy (formerly Stony Lake Therapeutic Riding Center). She is a Certified Therapeutic Recreational Specialist, a PATH Intl. CTRI® and an ESMHL candidate. Aubrey is passionate about mental health programming and brings her love of equines and serving people together to provide quality services in rural Michigan.

E3, Speech Therapy Incorporating Horses Part 1 CE

Come to a live demonstration of speech-language pathology therapy sessions incorporating horses! Four clients from RISE Rehabilitation at Renew TRC will attend. A discussion of how their speech therapy goals are addressed in the equine-assisted services environment will be first, followed by a Speech Therapy/Hippotherapy session with Q&A throughout, and finishing with Q&A with the SLPs, horse leaders, volunteers, and parents/families of the clients. You don't want to miss this one-of-a-kind presentation!

Dr. Beth Macauley is an Associate Professor in the Dept. of Communication Sciences and Disorders at Grand Valley State University in Grand Rapids, Ml. She received her BA, MA, and PhD from the University of Florida (Go Gators!) with specialization in brain related communication disorders. Dr. Macauley has integrated horses into speech-language pathology clinical services for over 30 years, conducted research in equine assisted services, and taught seminars on equine assisted services in 16 countries. Dr. Macauley is also the owner and lead SLP for RISE Rehabilitation at Renew TRC in Holland, Ml.

Jared Host is a native Michigander who graduated with a MS in SLP from GVSU in 2014. He began incorporating horses in SLP in August 2023. When not at Renew he works for Coopersville Public Schools or is at home with his dog Gia, or they are adventuring together in the great outdoors.

F1, Driving in an EAS Program and Making it Financially Viable CR Driving

A driving lesson is usually 1 or maybe 2 hours, with 1 turnout and 1 student at a time. This session will share multiple ways to have more students and make more money for the program during that 2-hour window.

Tina Bennett is the Executive Director for EHRSC. She is a PATH Intl. Driving Level III Instructor, Lead Driving Evaluator, CTRI®, ESMHL and mentor. She is currently the PATH Intl. Region 4 Ambassador and serves on the PICC committee and the Driving Committee. She also works with the MSU Michigan 4-H programs for PEP programs. Her other job is managing a breeding/ foaling barn in Freeland, Michigan.

F2, Equine Liability Waivers: How They Work and Whether Yours Needs an Overhaul CE

Courts nationwide have grappled with the meaning of equine activity liability laws – especially their exceptions. Exceptions in the laws are important as they could potentially allow certain lawsuits to proceed. Although all of the equine activity liability acts (referred to as "EALAs") differ, many share common characteristics. This session will explore the ins and outs of what is covered by your center's liability waiver and what you need to be aware of to protect both yourself as a professional and your center.

Julie Fershtman is considered to be one of the nation's leading attorneys in the field of equine law. She has successfully tried equine cases before juries in four states. A frequent author and speaker on legal issues, she has written over 400 published articles, four books, and has lectured at seminars, conventions, and conferences in 29 states on issues involving law, liability, risk management and insurance.

When working with horses, it's not if an emergency will occur - but WHEN. Being prepared to handle these emergencies could be the difference between life or death for our horses, and may even be the reason your center survives a natural disaster. Topics will include, first aid fundamentals, pain detection, treating common conditions, key elements of farm disaster prevention, and preparing for natural disasters.

Brooke Archer is a PATH Intl. CTRI® and the current PATH Intl. Region 4 Representative. She has been an active horsewoman for most of her life. She recently graduated with a master's degree in nonprofit administration from Notre Dame and keeps herself busy these days working at a vet clinic. Brook was the 2022 PATH Intl. National Credentialed Professional of the Year.

Small changes in the way we interact can yield big results. This is a practical discussion that will go beyond lingo and theory to give those who are working in PATH Intl. centers hands on tools to take back with them to the barn.

Natasha (Tasha) Malinchoc-Federinko has been a PATH Intl. Advanced Instructor since 1994. A lifelong horse woman, after the requisite pony rides, she began riding in second grade, with a wonderful, huge old draft horse named Amos. This presentation will cover the details of a summer camp held for young children who have experienced foster care or adoption. The aim is to educate the audience on the challenges of working with children who have complex trauma needs, to help them to understand the rationale for the structure of Pony Pals programming as it was incorporated at Renew Therapeutic Riding Center, and to inspire other centers to include similar programs utilizing the knowledge and skills they gained by attending this session.

Emily Hill has a Bachelors of Social Work from George Fox University. She started volunteering at a PATH Intl. center in 2013 and has been employed as a certified therapeutic riding instructor at Renew Therapeutic Riding Center since 2019. Before that, she worked in foster care, meeting with children to help them to understand the process of being in care.

K2, Role of Thoroughbred Horses in EAS CR All
