Sensory Issues, Trauma Healing and Horses! DE

Attendees will learn about the alchemy of the felt sense and trust, building a concept of SELF, nervous system regulation and how healing arts with horses can assist in the process.

Karisa Kloscak, MC, LPC-AZ, LPCC-CA, SEP, RYT 200, EAP is a licensed professional counselor in Arizona and California. She specializes in trauma healing and has learned from some of the nation's leading experts in the field at The Meadows. Karisa is also a yoga instructor, somatic experiencing practitioner, EA-EMDR facilitator, and a human in recovery who likes to meditate with horses whenever possible. She has embraced the healing arts along her own 17-year recovery journey. Karisa enjoys training others as an assistant for somatic experiencing and SEGAN The Sensory Mosaic of Healing. She is the founder of Omni Healing Movement (OHM) which incorporates many forms of healing needed to resolve trauma.

You will then learn how to make your instruction more comprehensible to the ELs in your program, and practice collaborative strategies to get your English learners using their new language in fun and meaningful ways.

She currently runs the newcomer program for EUSD that provides support and services to students and families new to the country. What You Need to Know to Grow: A Conversation About Best Practices for Your Size and Scale CE

Mission Possible: The Key Components to Preparing and Facilitating Sessions for Veterans, Active-duty Military and First Responders CE

As PATH Intl. professionals, it is vital for us to familiarize ourselves with and gain as much knowledge as possible about the populations we serve. Studies have proven the benefits of equine-assisted services for our activeduty military, veterans and first responders, and the implementation of these programs is on the rise. Gaining insight into the unique cultures of these specific groups, their ways of communication and the importance of 'completing the mission', equips us with valuable knowledge that is beneficial when preparing and facilitating sessions in a manner that allows them to acquire, retain and apply knowledge and skills. Participants will engage in exercises, with and without equines, highlighting key concepts and teaching methods that are important when working with our military and first responders.

Paige Courtney is a PATH Intl. CTRI and ESMHL with over ten years of experience providing EAS, and she has never known a life without horses in it. While she enjoys working with a wide variety of groups, her heart lies with our active-duty military, veterans, first responders and their families. As a 911 dispatcher of over 13 years and the sister of a career United States Marine, her experiences bring a unique outlook and insight to communication styles and teaching methods that are valuable when working with these particular populations.

Chief Warrant Officer 3 Shane Nolen is an EOD (Explosive Ordnance Disposal) Technician with Marine Wing Support Squadron 372 stationed at Camp Pendleton. With over 21 years of service and multiple combat deployments, his role as a U.S. Marine has gone from being 'boots on the ground' to one of leadership and training. His insight into the culture and mindset of our military, provides invaluable information to those who choose to work with this population.

Behavior is Communication **DE**

Break

When we understand the function of a behavior and what it is communicating, we can make simple changes to our approach and replace maladaptive behaviors to socially appropriate behaviors. This makes our students be the most successful rider they can be!

Donna van Nieuwenhuyzen has provided behavior support at REINS for 2+ years. She grew up in Norco California, and has enjoyed reconnecting with the horse community at REINS. When not at REINS, Donna provides training and coaching for teachers and paraprofessionals at Alvord Unified School District. She is also a Crisis Prevention Instructor (CPI), providing de-escalation techniques and appropriate staff response when an individual is in crisis. Donna's journey in behavior started 25 years ago when she started working at California School for the Deaf with the special needs population. This journey set her up with the behavioral foundation needed when her own son was diagnosed with Autism 3 years later. Over the years she has continued gaining the knowledge and understanding that behavior is a way we communicate, and that our response to that behavior has an impact on the situation both positively and negatively. Donna also has served her community as a volunteer firefighter and although she no longer serves in this capacity, she likes to think she puts out and prevents 'behavioral fires."

Youth-at-Risk Summer Project CE

This session will discuss the youth-at-risk summer camp that exposes young people to the magic of horses. Campers establish a connection with horses based on equine body language and behavior, and build a relationship with a chosen equine partner based on mutual trust and respect. These equine interactions help build self-awareness and a positive self-image. Each week provides activities and discussions with an emphasis on forming relationships with a horse and other youth.

Barbara Auerbach, J.D. was a supervising attorney in the Los Angeles County Children's Court, and she specialized in issues relating to children and families in family law, dependency, delinquency, juvenile justice, probate, civil and adoption courts. She has spent many years attending Individual Educational Programs (IEP) for children with disabilities. She also has a degree in speech pathology and audiology. She has trained judges, attorneys, parents, social workers, foster parents and others to advocate for children and adults with special needs. She has lectured as an expert in fetal alcohol spectrum disorder. Currently she is the executive director of The Circle of Horses and is a PATH Intl. CTRI.

Finding the Neutral Seat: A Never-Ending Challenge CR Riding

This presentation will cover what a neutral seat position is, why it is important, and will provide instructors with easily implementable methods that will help riders achieve and maintain the neutral seat. Discussion will include horse and tack selection, mounted exercises and teaching techniques. Attendees will develop an "eye" for anterior and posterior pelvic tilt as well as lateral pelvic tilt and pelvic axial rotation. The discussion will also cover different disabilities (physical, cognitive, and emotional) in relation to the challenge of finding a neutral seat position. Instructors will learn how to implement a variety of methods to address the needs of each rider.

Amy Sheets is a PATH Intl. Master Instructor and CTRI. She is a lead evaluator for the PATH Intl. master and advanced instructor certifications. She is an instructor at Ivey Ranch and owner of Hoofbeats Horse and Rider Training, LLC.

Lunch and Learn - Instructor to Student: Angela's Story CR Riding

Grab lunch and join this session to hear about Angela's journey through teaching adaptive riding lessons to receiving a MS diagnosis and returning as a client with a disability. With the partnership of her instructor, they navigated a new dynamic in and out of the saddle. This session will outline the progress made within the lessons, and all that's been learned along the way. It has not been an easy road for Angela, and she has a lot of insight into the struggles that other riders may face. She has the unique experience of also being a PATH Intl. CTRI, so her ability to put riders' experience at the forefront of lesson planning and skill progression is rare and valuable. Angela's journey back into the saddle has truly shown the grit, passion and dedication of a true horsewoman.

Brie Doherty is a PATH Intl. Advanced Instructor and the program director for Ride On LA, which now operates out of four ranches providing services in adaptive riding and PT/OT/ST. She has been teaching lessons since 2007 to a wide variety of riders. In addition to teaching, she has mentored many instructor candidates through certification and continues to provide support and continuing education for Ride On's team of instructors. She has competed extensively in Dressage over the years, is a USDF bronze and silver medalist on her personal horse and is working towards her gold medal.
